EQUIPMENT UPDATE:

Over the past few years the Lawrence SWCD has went to great lengths to improve our rental equipment. In all the District has spent over \$24,000 on its rental equipment program. Over \$17,000 has been spent on repairs and upgrades to our existing equipment. Plus, another \$6,900 was spent on the purchase of a new Pequea Manure Spreader. Some of the upgrades on the 7000 John Deere No-Till Corn Planters are the installation of single disk fertilizer openers, top contact wheel drive system and new style cast iron closing wheels (with t-handle adjustments). The John Deere 1750 Conservation No-Till Corn Planter is currently having the fertilizer openers rebuilt. Also, it is receiving new cast iron seed unit shanks and a new drive clutch pack. Additional repairs have been made to the Tye No-Till Drills and Stoltzfus Lime Spreader.

Product Descriptions

Deciduous Trees

Black Cherry (Prunus serotina) height of 60+ft. at maturity. Used for lumber/veneer/furniture. Dark green leaves in summer/yellowish in fall. Small black fruit provides food for birds and mammals. Tolerates a wide variety of growing conditions.

Black Walnut (Juglans nigra) 70 ft. height & spread at maturity. Rapid growing. Common in all of Ohio. Dark green leaves. Produces nuts that are preferred by wildlife. Valued for timber/ veneer/furniture. Grows well in most locations. Prefers fertile/deep soils & full to part sun. Northern Red Oak (Quercus rubra) 80+ft. at maturity. Relatively fast growing. Leaves are shiny green in summer and rustic red in fall. Excellent tree for street or yard. Prefers full sun and acidic soil. Commercial value for furniture and lumber. Acoms are round and 34-1 in. long. These acoms are at the top of the preference list for wild turkeys/squirrels/deer/racoons/black bears. Deer browse the buds & twigs in wintertime.

Sugar Maple (Acer saccharum) Can be over 100 ft. at maturity. Large shade tree. Leaves can turn brilliant yellow/orange/red in the fall. Prefers partial to full sun and well-drained soil. White Oak (Quercus alba) 100+ft. at maturity. Large, broadleaf tree. Semi-shade tolerant. Found on a variety of sites. Grows best in deep/sandy loam soil on south/west facing slopes. Acoms are up to 1 in. long with a warty cap. One of the best sources of food for wildlife.

Coniferous Trees

Bald Cypress (Taxodium distichum) 100-120 ft & 3-6 ft. in diameter at maturity. Deciduous conifer. Large/slow-growing. Leaves are alternate/ linear/flat with blades generally spreading around the twig. Prefers very wet soils. Excellent for erosion control/timber/wildlife.

Eastern Redcedar (Juniperus virginiana) 30 ft. height and 15 ft. Spread at maturity. A type of Juniper. Medium growing. Excellent windbreak. Aromatic heartwood. Used for cedar chests/ non-rotting fence posts. Tolerates just about any type of soil. Does well in full sun to partial sun. Should not be planted near apple trees due to cedar-apple rust.

Eastern White Pine (Pinus strobus) 80+ft. at maturity. Outstanding timber pine due to its large size. Fast growing. Has long/soft/light green needles. Grows well in many soil types. Used for windbreaks/wildlife habitat. Prefers full sun/tolerates some shade. Not salt tolerant.

Norway Spruce (Picea abies) 100 ft. at maturity. One of the fastest growing spruces. Extremely attractive evergreen has strong/distinctive/sweeping branches. Needles are flat/shiny green 1/2-1in. Long. Grows well on most sites. Used for omamentals/windbreaks.

Virginia Pine (Pinus virginia) Up to 70 ft. at maturity. Small to medium sized. Grows best in full sun/well-drained so //sandy acidic loam. Slow growth rate. Moderately pollution tolerant. Will grow in poorldry soils. Seeds are a food source for many birds. Resistant to damage by deer.

Specialty Tree and Shrub Packets

Wildlife Packet (4 each of the following species - 24 seedlings total - No Substitutions) Chinkapin Oak (Quercus muehlenbergii) 40-60 ft tall and spread of 50-70 ft. at maturity. Prefers full sun. Adapts to a wide range of soil conditions. Needs a pH >7. Acoms are 1/2-1" in size and attract birds and mammals. Relatively pest free including resistance to oak wilt. American Elderberry (Sambucus canadensis) Reaches a height and spread of 5-12 ft. at maturity. White blooms from June to July. Grows in medium to wet/well-drained soils in full sun/ part shade. Tolerates a wide range of soils. Prefers moist/humus soil. Spreads by root suckers. Sometimes used to make jams/jellies/wine. Attracts birds and butterflies.

American Ptum (Prunus americana) Height of 20 ft. and spread of 25 ft. at maturity. White blossoms emerge in early spring. Adaptable to a wide variety of conditions. Needs full sun. Hazelnut (Corylus americana) 15-18 ft. height & 10-12 ft. at maturity. Nut-producing shrub. Full sun/partial shade are best for this shrub. Needs a minimum of 4 hours of direct/unfiltered sunlight each day. Grows in acidic/alkaline/loamy/moist/rich/sandy/well drained/clay soils. Drought-tolerant. Should be planted in multiples (2 or 3). Nuts are preferred by wildlife. Persimmon (Diospyros virginiana) 50 ft. height & 30 ft. spread at maturity. Adaptable to a variety of soil/moisture/polluted conditions. Prefers moist/well-drained/average soils of various pH's. Adapts to poor/rocky/clay/sandy or even organic soils of dry or moist constitution. Will not tolerate wet sites. Needs full to partial sun. Primarily a dioecious species (male and female flowers on separate trees). Yellow flower in late spring/early summer.

Shagbark Hickory (Carya ovata) 100 ft. height and spread of 40 ft. at maturity. Found in dry uplands or moist valleys. Prized for making tool handles, athletic equipment, furniture, construction timbers, and firewood. Sought after for smoking meats. Produces sweet and large nuts relished by wildlife.

SEEDLING SIZE: Tree & shrub seedlings are typically between 6-18 inches tall, depending on the species.

Hardwood Packet (4 each of the following species - 20 seedlings total - No Substitutions) Black Cherry See Deciduous Trees For Description.

Black Walnut See Deciduous Trees For Description.

Northern Red Oak /See Deciduous Trees For Description.

White Oak See Deciduous Trees For Description.

Tulip (Yellow) Poplar (Linodendron tulipilera) Height of 80 ft. and spread of 40 ft. at maturity. Flowering in late May/early June. Grows in full/partial sun. Prefers moist but well-drained/ slightly acidic/deep/rich soil. Can adapt to other soil conditions. Early/mid season bloom.

Fruits and Mushrooms

Dwarf Grimes Golden Apple (2 trees) Height and spread or 10 ft. Great for eating fresh/ canning/freezing/drying/applesauce/apple butter. Fruit around September. Considered self pollinating. Grow best in well-drained/loamy soils/full sun. Ideal soil pH in the 6.0 to 7.0 range. Shiitake Mushroom (1 kit) 2-4 in. diameter with brown/slightly convex caps. Contains 200 inoculated shiitake dowel plugs, 1/4 lb. bees wax, dauber, 5 labeling tags, and guide. Will plug approximately 10 logs that are 40 in. long & 3 in. diameter (logs not included).

Seed Mixes

Create Food Plots for Wildlife with Whitetail 365! (25 lb. bag) Can be planted from early spring through late fall. Oats, rye, & 2 varieties of peas ensure that something is always growing & providing forage for deer year-round. Covers ½ acre.

Erosion Control Seed Mix (2 lb. bag) A blend of Birdsfoot Trefoil, Timothy, Tall Fescue, Annual Ryegrass, Alsike Clover, & Red Top. Excellent substitute for crownvetch. For severe erosion control measures. Covers 2000 sq. ft.

Showy Northeast Native Wildflower & Grass Seed Mix (1 oz. packet) 2-3 ft. average height. Mix of native wildflowers & prairie grasses. Contains drought resistant species. Full sun/part shade. Excellent for native meadows & wildflower patches. Covers 200 sq. ft.

Pollinator Seed Mixes

Created by Pheasants Forever. Diverse high-quality long-lasting wildlife habitat, meets ODA standards & exceed NRCS standards. Both mixes meet criteria set forth by NRCS for the CSP program and by FSA for CRP practice CP42 - Pollinator Habitat. If you are purchasing seed for these programs, be sure to follow all standards & specs as directed from NRCS/FSA. (Steeper slopes may require a grass component/refer to your DC to ensure the mix meets these requirements. Sold in 1/2 ac. increments.

Native Groundcover - (25 Per Packet)

Wild Ginger (Asarum candensis) 4-8 in. at maturity. Native spring wildflower. Easily grown in a variety of soil types/in part shade to full shade. Spreads slowly by rhizomes. Plant 8-12 in. apart. Partridge Berry (Mitchella reptans) 2 in. at maturity. Mat-forming evergreen. Displays interesting foliage/flowers/fruit. Tolerates heavy shade/dry conditions. Plant 8-12 in, apart. Wild Geranium (Geranium maculatum) Grows 1-2 ft. high. Flowers 1-1.5 inches across. Does well under a variety of growing conditions. Prefers part to full shade. Plant 8-12 inches apart.

Wildlife Boxes

Bat House Bats are the primary predators of beetles, moths, leafhoppers, mosquitoes, and other insects. This cedar bat house will provide roosting locations for these nocturnal mammals. Eastern Bluebird Box Bluebirds readily accept nesting boxes to raise their young. These cedar nest boxes should be placed at least 300 ft. apart.

Tree Supplies

Tree Marking Flags 30 inch high metal stake with a 4 x 5 inch purple flag. Plantskydd 100% organic, safe for use in protecting flowers/ornamentals/seedlings/shrubs/ trees/fruits/vegetables/other food crops against browse damage from deer and rabbits.
